Capt. Algernon H. Binyon Funeral Rites Today

Funeral services for Capt. Algernon H. Binyon, 71, of Pleasant Valley, Va., who died Wednesday at Doctors Hospital were to be held at 2 p.m. today in the Perry & Walsh funeral home, 29 H street N.W. Burial was to be in Congressional Cemetery.

Born in Italy of English parents, Capt. Binyon became a citizen of this country in 1925. He had been a resident of Washington from then until last summer, when he moved to Loudoun County.

Capt. Binyon served in the Royal Air Force during the first World War. Afterward, he was employed as an engineer in the Bureau of Standards here. Recently he had spent his time in the study of lighter-than-air craft.

He was a member of the Society of Automotive Engineers and the Aeronautic Society. Surviving are his widow Mrs. Caroline Bean Binyon, portrait painter; a brother, Bertram Binyon of Somerset, England, and a sister, Bianca Chiesa of Capri, Italy.

Capt. A.H. Binyon Funeral Service Set for Today

Funeral services for Capt. Algernon H. Binyon, of Pleasant Valley, Loudoun County, Va., who died at Doctors Hospital Wednesday at the age of 71, after a long illness, will be held today at 2 p.m. at Perry & Walsh's funeral home, 29 H Street Northwest, with burial in Congressional Cemetery.

Capt. Binyon served in the R.A.F. During the First World War, and was a member of the Society of Automotive Engineers and the Aeronautic Society. After the war he was employed by the Bureau of Standards here. In recent years he retired to devote his time to studying the military use of lighter-than-air ships. He formerly lived in Georgetown.

He was born in Italy of an English father, received his education in England and became an American citizen in 1925. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Caroline Binyon.
