Miss K.E. Bohrer, 76, Teacher in District For 45 Years, Dies

Miss Katherine E. Bohrer, 76, teacher in Washington's public schools for 45 years, died yesterday at her apartment, 1708 Newton street N.W., after a brief illness.

Miss Bohrer was a member of an old Washington family. She was the eldest daughter of George Philip Bohrer and Eva Hancock Bohrer, and was the first child christened at the Metropolitan Presbyterian Church, Fourth and B sreets S.E.
