Mrs. William Bopp, 91, Born Here of Old D.C. Family

Mrs. Mary A. Bopp, 91, whose family has lived in Washington for more than a century, died yesterday at the Masonic & Eastern Star Home here after a brief illness.

Mrs. Bopp, a life-long District resident, was born in a house near the Washington National Cathedral, in what was then known as the Tenleytown area.

Her father, William Langley, ran a butcher stand for many years in the old central market at Seventh street and Constitution avenue N.W. The Langley family was among the original subscribers to The Star in 1852, and until last December Mrs. Bopp went out to buy the paper every day.

She left the Washington area only twice, once on a trip to Philadelphia and once to Baltimore, "on the steam cars," as she put it.

Mrs. Bopp, who attended public schools in the District, recalled rushing with her father to the scene of the shooting of President Garfield in 1881.

Mrs. Bopp was a member of the Metropolitan Methodist Church.

Her husband, William, died about 35 years ago. Mrs. Bopp's home address before entering a nursing home last fall was 4428 Windham place N.W.

She leaves a daughter, Mrs. Rose E. Nicholson, of the Windham place address; three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. A son, W. Elmer Bopp, died last year.

Funeral services will be at 1 p.m. tomorrow at the Hines Funeral Home, 2901Fourteenth street N.W. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.
