Samuel Brenton

(22 Nov 1810 – 29 Mar 1857)

A Representative from Indiana; born in Gallatin County, Ky., November 22, 1810; attended the public schools; was ordained to the Methodist ministry in 1830 and served as a minister; located at Danville, Ind. in 1834 because of ill health, and studied law; member of the State house of representatives 1838-41; in 1841, upon the restoration of his health, returned to the ministry and served at Crawfordsville, Perryville, Lafayette and finally at Fort Wayne, where he suffered a paralytic stroke in 1848 and was compelled to abandon his ministerial duties; appointed register of the land office at Fort Wayne, Ind. on May 2, 1849, and served until July 31, 1851 when he resigned; elected as a Whig to the 32nd Congress (March 4, 1851 to March 3, 1853); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1852 to the 33rd Congress, elected as a Republican to the 34th and 35th Congresses and served from March 4, 1855 until his death in Fort Wayne, Ind., March 29, 1857; interment in Lindenwood Cemetery.
