Wife Finds Body Upon Return Home--Indigestion Believed to be Cause of Death

The body was discovered by his wife, whom he had preceded home from Sunday school at the East Capitol street branch of the Second Baptist Church.

Athletic apparatus by his side indicated that Mr. Brown had been taking exercises prescribed for treating indigestion.

Mr. Brown was 61 years old. Until a few years ago he was night watchman and desk clerk at The Star and recently had operated an elevator. Active in Masonic circles, he was a member of Naval Lodge, F.A.A.M.; Eureka Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, and the Orient Commandery, Knights Templar.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Sarah F. Brown; two sons, George T. Brown, jr., of Clarendon, Va. and Charles E. Brown of this city, and two daughters, Mrs. Mamie Seabold and Mrs. Dorothy Leonard, both of Washington.

Funeral services will be conducted in the East Capitol street branch of the Second Baptist Church Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. E.C. Primm will officiate. Interment will be in Congressional Cemetery.
