Elmer A. Carroll Dies; Was Member of Old Washington Family

Elmer A. Carroll, 85, member of one of Washington's oldest families and a retired Pennsylvania Railroad Co. employe, died yesterday at home, 407 Seward square S.E. He had been in failing health for 10 days.

Mr. Carroll was born in Prince Georges County and had lived in Washington since a child. He was a direct descendant of Daniel Carroll, manorial lord of Duddington, who was one of the three commissioners appointed by President Washington to superintend the building of the Federal city. The Capitol stands on land formerly owned by him.

Mr. Carroll was with the Pennsylvania Railroad for 35 years, retiring in June, 1932 as a bridge construction foreman. He was a life member of the Washington Board of Trade and belonged to the Christ Episcopal Church.

Funeral services for Elmer A. Carroll, 85, a member of one of Washington's oldest families, will be held at 11 a.m. today at the Lee funeral home, 4th st. and Massachusetts ave. ne. Interment will be in Congressional Cemetery.

Mr. Carroll died Saturday at his home, 407 Seward sq. se. He had been in failing health for years.

A native of Prince Georges County, he was a direct descendant of Daniel Carroll, who was one of three commissioners named by George Washington to supervise construction of the Capital City.

Mr. Carroll was a life member of the Washington Board of Trade, and retired as a bridge construction foreman in 1932 after 35 years with the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. He was a member of Christ Episcopal Church.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Esther Louise Carroll, and a sister, Mrs. Nettie White of 91 Elmira st. sw.
