Mrs. D.C. Carwithen Dies at Colonial Beach

Mrs. David Courtney Carwithen, sr., 55, who retired six days ago as a personnel officer at the Smithsonian Institution after 30 years' employment there, died yesterday at Colonial Beach, Va.

Mrs. Carwithen was vacationing at her summer home at the beach when stricken with a heart attack. She had suffered an acute heart condition for the last year. Her home was at 3509 North Eighth street, Arlington.

Born in Washington, she was the former Miss Bertha Tyler.

Before joining the staff at the Smithsonian, Mrs. Carwithen was employed at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and the Navy Department. In World War I she served as a yeomanette.

Her husband has been associated with Rudolph & West Hardware Co. here for 30 years.

Mrs. Carwithen was a member of the Jacob Jones Post of the American Legion and St. George's Episcopal Church, Arlington.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a son, David C. Carwithen, jr. of New York City, and a sister, Mrs. Katherine Bailey of Fairfax, Va.
