Paul Cohill Dies, Ex-Grid Official

Paul Cohill, well-known former football official here, died early today at Emergency Hospital where he had been a patient almost two weeks.

Cohill, who reached his 64th year yesterday, suffered a stroke in a downtown drug store January 22, and had been hospitalized since.

One of the most popular and respected officials in football, Cohill was a charter member of the Washington District Football Officials Association. He suffered a heart attack about six years ago and, on doctor's orders, divorced himself completely from the sport.

Cohill was employed by the Southern Railroad in the office of the auditor of disbursements. He had been with the company 44 years, reporting on the job September 22, 1913.

Cohill lived with his wife at 7315 Twelfth street N.W.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed.
