## Albert T. Coumbe, 80, U.S. Economic Analyst

Albert T. Coumbe, 80, a retired economist analyst with the U.S. Bureau of Mines, died Friday at Springfield State Hospital in Sykesville, Md., of heart disease.

He lived at 8016 Piney Branch rd., Silver Spring.

A native of this area, Mr. Coumbe retired in 1958 after 33 years with the Bureau. His reports on petroleum production were published as trade information bulletins by the Commerce Department and later by the Interior Department when the Bureau was transferred there.

He studied mining engineering at Cornell after graduating from the former Central High School here and spent several years in the Dutch East Indies, now Indonesia, as an employe of the Standard Oil Co of New York.
