Miss Ann Louisa Croggon, 74, for 20 years an employe of the United States Post Office, died yesterday at her home, 625 Maryland avenue N.E. Funeal services will be held there Saturday at 2 p.m., with burial in Congressional Cemetery.

Born and educated in the District, Miss Croggon held several temporary Government jobs before she started work for the Post Office in 1917, retiring in 1937. She was the daughter of the late James and Elizabeth Croggon. James Croggon began reporting for The Star in 1862, and shortly after 1890 started a local history column, which he continued until his death 25 years ago.

Miss Croggon was a member of the Society of Natives and of the Treaty Oak Chapter of the Eastern Star. She attended Waugh Methodist Church.
