Judson T. Cull, Sr. Dies At Age of 87

Oldest Member of District Bar Was Noted as Authority on Realty Matters

Judson T. Cull, sr., 87, oldest member of the District bar, having been admitted to practice October 22, 1867, died today at his home 114 Second street southeast, where he has resided for the last 50 years. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Mr. Cull was active in the practice of the law until shortly before his death, writing opinions on real estate law and titles for the Home Title Insurance Co. of which he was president. He was held in high regard by the bench and bar as an authority on real estate law and was the organizer and first president of Washington's first corporate title company, the Lawyers' Title Insurance Co.

Recently the United States in a condemnation proceeding condemned his home for the development of the addition to the Library of Congress. As a result, Mr. Cull personally supervised about three weeks ago, the beginning of the foundation for a new home at Kenwood, Md.

Attorney C. Clinton James announced to Chief Justice Alfred A. Wheat the death of Mr. Cull and asked that the

minutes of the court show an adjournment out of respect to his memory. The chief justice expressed his regret and directed the adjournment to be shown on the records.

The lawyer is survived by five children, Mary; Virginia and Florence Cull, Mrs. Morrison B. French and Judson T. Cull, jr., and two grandchildren, Judson and Betty French.

Funeral Tomorrow

Rites To Be Held At Lawyer's Late Home

Oldest member of the District bar, who died yesterday, for whom funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. tomorrow, at his late residence, 114 Second street southeast, where he had lived for more than 50 years. Rev. John C. Weidley, pastor of the Church of the Reformation, will officiate. Burial will be private at Congressional Cemetery.

Mr. Cull was a native of Washington, having been born here January 7, 1845. He was graduated from old Columbian College in 1863. In 1866, a year before his admission to the bar, he was elected attorney for the Metropolis Building Association and continued to hold the position until his death. The present board of directors of the building association will act as pallbearers at the funeral.
