Woman, 75, Injured In Fall Under Car

Miss Nettie H. Graham in Critical Condition After Tumble Beneath Trolley

Miss Nettie H. Graham, 75, of 1603 Nineteenth street, is in a critical condition at Emergency Hospital from injuries received when she apparently fell from a street car loading platform at Eleventh and G streets beneath a street car, operated by a motorman whose street car killed a man at the same intersection on January 6.

Miss Graham was treated for a fractured skull, a serious back injury and abrasions about the body.

The motorman, Daniel I. Hartnett, 715-1/2 Eighth street southwest, was exonerated in the death of Charlie Jackson, colored, killed in the accident of January 6.

Miss Graham is the sister of Annie E. Graham, an employe of the Commerce Department, who lives with her at the Nineteenth street address.

In the meantime, the 1936 traffic toll for the District stood at 13 fatalities following the death last night of Miss Nettie H. Graham, 60, of 1603 Nineteenth street. The total for the same period last year was only 5.

Miss Graham died in Emergency Hospital from injuries suffered several hours earlier, when she was strck by a steet car at Eleventh and G streets. She was believed to have fallen from a loading platform into the path of the car, which was operated by Daniel I. Hartnett, 715-1/2 Eighth street southwest.

Hartnett also was the motorman of the car which killed Charles Jackson, colored, at the same corner on January 6. The motorman later was exonerated.
