## **Serious Accident to a Lady**

In trying to avoid the express wagon, she was knocked down by the omnibus and run over, the wheels passing directly over her breast. It is feared that she is very badly hurt, although the extent of her injuries are not yet known. The driver of the omnibus, John Whaley, was taken before Justice Donn and held for trial as soon as Mrs. Gunnell is able to appear against him. We are glad to learn today that Mrs. Gunnell is better, and is expected to recover.
