Harold M. Kiesel

Harold M. (Hal) Kiesel, 70, a retired tax analyst with the Internal Revenue Service and a former captain of the basketball team at George Washington University, died of cancer Nov. 28 at Holy Cross Hospital.

Mr. Kiesel, who lived in Kensington, was born in Vevay, Ind. He moved to Washington in 1931 and went to work for the Patent Office. He also attended George Washington University, where he graduated. He joined the Bureau of Internal Revenue, now the IRS, in 1937, and remained there until his retirement.

In World War II, he served in the Navy and won the Bronze Star during the Normandy invasion. He also served on active duty during the Korean conflict.

Mr. Kiesel was a member of the GW Lettermen's Club, the Thad Dulin Post of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Survivors include his wife, Eldridge Loeffler Kiesel of Kensington; a son, Gregory Garnett of Waldorf, Md.; a daughter, Gail Eldridge Feeney of Rye, N.Y.; his mother, Alsie Garner Kiesel of Vevay; two brothers, Jack A., of Indianapolis, and Chester Lynn, of Whiteland, Ind., and five grandchildren.
