Mrs. Carrie L. Mallon, Mother of Writer, Dies

Mrs. Carrie L. Morsman Mallon, 87, mother of Miss Winifred Mallon, Washington correspondent for the New York Times, died yesterday at her home, the Woodward Apartments, 2311 Connecticut avenue N.W. She had been ill since January with a heart ailment.

Mrs. Mallon, a native of North Evans, N.Y., was the widow of Robert Patrick Mallon who died here in 1912. She was the daughter of Lewis William and Maria M. Morsman Harvey. She was a descendant of William Woodbury of Somerset, England, who settled in Beverly, Mass., in 1628, and of Dean Carlton, one of the eight original members of the Congregational Church in this country.

Besides Miss Mallon, she leaves another daughter, Mrs. Charles D. Oothoudt of Oakland, Calif.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow at the Church of the Reformation, 212 East Capitol street, with burial in Congressional Cemetery.

Mrs. Mallon, 87, Mother of D.C. Writer Dies

Washington Resident Since 1891 Succumbs After Heart Attack

Mrs. Carrie L. Morsman Mallon, 87, mother of Miss Winifred Mallon, Washington correspondent for the New York Times, died early yesterday at her residence, the Woodward Apartments, 2311 Connecticut avenue.

Mrs. Mallon, a resident of Washington since 1891, died after a heart attack.

Mrs. Mallon was the widow of Robert Patrick Mallon, who died here in 1912, when the family lived at 431 New Jersey avenue southeast. Her ancestors were among the earliest settlers of Massachusetts. She was a seventh generation descendant of William Woodbury, who came from Wales in 1628, while another forebear, Dean Carlton, was one of eight original members of the Congregational Church in this country.

Mrs. Mallon was a native of North Evans, N.Y. She leaves another daughter, Mrs. Charles D. Oothoudt, Oakland, Calif.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p.m. Tomorrow, in the Church of the Reformation, 212 East Capitol street. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.
