### **John T. McKnight, 80; Terminal Co. Foreman**

John T. McKnight Sr., 80, a retired Washington Terminal foreman at Union Station who had a long career in semipro baseball here, died of cancer Saturday at his home, 726 Irving st. ne.

A machinist who specialized in passenger locomotives, Mr. McKnight was a gang and roundhouse foreman for the Washington Terminal Co. before retiring in 1940, after 40 years service. He had worked briefly for the Government and the Pennsylvania Railroad after coming to Washington in 1901.

Born in Augusta, Ga., he was a pitcher for that city's team in the South Atlantic League and tried out unsuccessfully with the Boston Braves before coming here.

Mr. McKnight pitched for and managed several Washington semi-pro teams, including the Union Station team that he coached to District, Maryland and Virginia championships in 1920.

He was a member of the Elks and the Knights of Columbus Washington Council.

Surviving are three sons, John T. Jr., of Columbia pike, Arlington, Robert E., of Mink Hollow rd., Highland, Md., and Charles W., of McLean, Va., and two daughters, E. Lee McKnight, of Hackensack, N.J. and Mary E. Farmer, of the home.
