Columbia Lodge of Masons to Be in Charge of Rites for Retired Machinist

Thomas Parker Mitchell 72, of 4107 Eighth street N.W., retired machinist of the Washington Navy Yard, died suddenly Monday when stricken with a heart attack while walking on the street near his home. He recently had been ill but was believed recovering when stricken.

Mr. Mitchell had worked at the Navy Yard some 30 years when retired a few years ago. He was an active member of the International Association of Machinists and belonged to the Columbia Lodge of Masons here. He was a native of Wales.

Surviving are a son, John L. Mitchell, assistant treasurer of Shannon & Luchs Co., real estate firm; a sister, Mrs. E.A. Cameron of Wales, and three grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow in the Wallace Memorial United Presbyterian Church. The Columbia Lodge of Masons will be in charge. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery with Masonic rites at the grave.
