### **Twelve Years on Police Force**

#### **S.L. Nelson, Friend of All His Acquaintances, Dies from Stomach Trouble**

Samuel L. Nelson, for over twelve years a member of the Metropolitan police force, died at his home, 636 North Capitol street, at 7:40 o'clock last night. He was stricken down with stomach trouble September 14 and for some time all hope of his recovery had been abandoned. He was attached to the First Precinct, under Lieut. Amiss, and there is no one in the precinct more highly esteemed by his fellow-officers than was Private Nelson.

It is said of him that in all his years of service he did not make one enemy. As an officer he was highly praised by his superiors for his faithfulness and strict attention to duty. He frequently acted in the capacity of Sergeant. It was with great regret that the men at the First precinct heard of his death last night, and the same was true where ever Nelson was known, and he had an extensive acquaintance in the department.

The deceased officer was a widower having one small child, who is now left an orphan. Arrangements will be made today for the funeral. The dead policeman will be buried with befitting honors.
