Death of Joseph Oliveri Well Known Bandsman

Native of Palermo, Italy, Came to America in 1871 -- Retired About Four Years Ago

Joseph Oliveri, former member of the United States Marine Band and the Soldiers' Home Band, and well known in musical circles here, died Saturday at his residence, 518 1st street southeast. Funeral services are to be held tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the residence and then at Memorial Church, near 12th and M streets northwest.

Mr. Oliveri, who was seventy-six years old, was a native of Palermo, Italy. Coming to America in 1871, he joined the Marine Band two years later. In 1876 he resigned his post in the band to accompany the "Pianoforte Opera," with John Philip Sousa as leader. When Sousa rejoined the Marine Band some months later, Mr. Oliveri also rejoined, and remained in the band until 1905, when he resigned.

Mr. Oliveri entered the Soldiers' Home Band in 1906 and served for eight years, when he retired permanently. He is survived by his wife and eleven children. They are Edward Oliveri, Mrs. George F. Lewis, Miss Elizabeth Oliveri, Joseph Oliveri, jr., Paul Francis Oliveri, Vincent Oliveri, Mrs. John Messina, Salvadore Oliveri, Miss Jennie Oliveri, George Oliveri and Miss Lillie Oliveri.
