Efforts of the fire department rescue squad and physicians from Emergency Hospital yesterday afternoon failed to revive Mrs. Marion Edith Parker, 47 years old, apartment 314, 2401 Connecticut avenue, after she was found overcome by gasoline fumes. She was pronounced dead by Dr. I. Rutkoski, of the hospital staff.

Mrs. Parker, a trained nurse, was found unconscious on the bathroom floor by a friend, Mrs. George R. Setter, 3000 Connecticut avenue. Near her head was an overturned bottle of gasoline which she had apparently been using to clean her apartment.

Coroner J. Ramsey Nevitt was told that Mrs. Parker has been suffering from heart trouble for a number of years. Acting on the opinion that the woman had fallen when overcome by the fumes, Dr. Nevitt issued a certificate of death from natural causes.
