Raymond Truitt Dies, Result of Injuries

Eighteen-Year-Old Motor Cycle Rider Collides With Electric Car -- Other Accidents

Raymond Truitt, eighteen years old, Anacostia road, Twining City, died at Emergency Hospital last night about 8 o'clock as a result of injuries he received one hour earlier, when he was thrown against a car of the Washington-Virginia Railway Company at 13th and C streets. The young man was riding a motor cycle and, it is stated, was unable to stop it in time to prevent it from striking the side of the electric car.

Police of the first precinct questioned the crew of the car and reported the facts to the coroner, who directed that the motorman and conductor be summoned to attend an inquest at the morgue this afternoon.

Death Due To Accident

Coroner's Verdict in the Case of Raymond Truitt

Coroner Nevitt conducted an inquest at the morgue yesterday afternoon in the case of Raymond Truitt, who died at Emergency Hospital Friday night as a result of injuries, when his motor cycle struck the side of an electric car of the Washington-Virginia Railway Company at 13th and C streets, one hour before death resulted.

The jury reported a verdict finding the accident was due to lack of care on the part of Truitt.
